# Crafts. Discover life's little pleasures.

#### **SUPPLIES & TOOLS:**

- Silver cloth refer to directions for yardage required
- Disappearing fabric marker
- Coordinating fabric refer to directions for yardage required
- Sewing machine
- Basic sewing supplies

#### **DIRECTIONS:**

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Salad fork: Width at widest part \_\_\_\_\_ Length \_\_\_\_\_

Dinner Fork: Width at widest part \_\_\_\_ Length \_\_\_\_\_

Teaspoon: Width at widest part \_\_\_\_ Length \_\_\_\_\_

Soup Spoon: Width at widest part \_\_\_\_ Length \_\_\_\_\_

Knife: Width at widest part \_\_\_\_ Length \_\_\_\_

## Determine fabric yardage:

To determine fabric width, measure width of each piece of silverware and add 1/2". Multiply that by the number of pieces in one "keeper" and add 1". (example: if one fork measures 1%" adding 1/2" equals 1%" or 1.75". If there are 8 forks in the set then the calculation would be 1.75" x 8 = 14" plus 1" is 15")

To determine fabric length, measure length of each piece of silverware and multiply by 2 and add 4". (example: if one fork measures  $8" \times 2 = 16"$  plus 4" is 20")

Cut silver cloth to measurements. Cut fabric 1" larger than each measurement.

### **Construction:**

- 1. Pin silver cloth and fabric wrong sides together having 1/2" of fabric extending past silver cloth all around.
- 2. Fold edge of fabric in 1/4" then over silver cloth 1/4" making narrow hem enclosing silver cloth.
- 3. Fold up approx. 3/4 of the length of silverware piece (example: fork measures 8", 3/4 = 6").
- 4. Pin. With marker, indicate sewing lines to make pockets for each piece and stitch.
- 5. Make tie from fabric using a  $1\frac{1}{4}$ " x 18" piece of fabric, fold in half, bring edges to center, fold and edge stitch.
- 6. Stitch center to edge of silver keeper. Or use an 18" piece of matching ribbon for ties.
